

- Postdoc or Fellow (Australia, overseas,...)
- Lecturer (finally)
- Senior Lecturer (after 2/3 years)
- Associate Professor/Reader (after 2/3 years)

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Nowadays it is not uncommon (in Australia) to land a permanent job more than 10 years after your PhD
